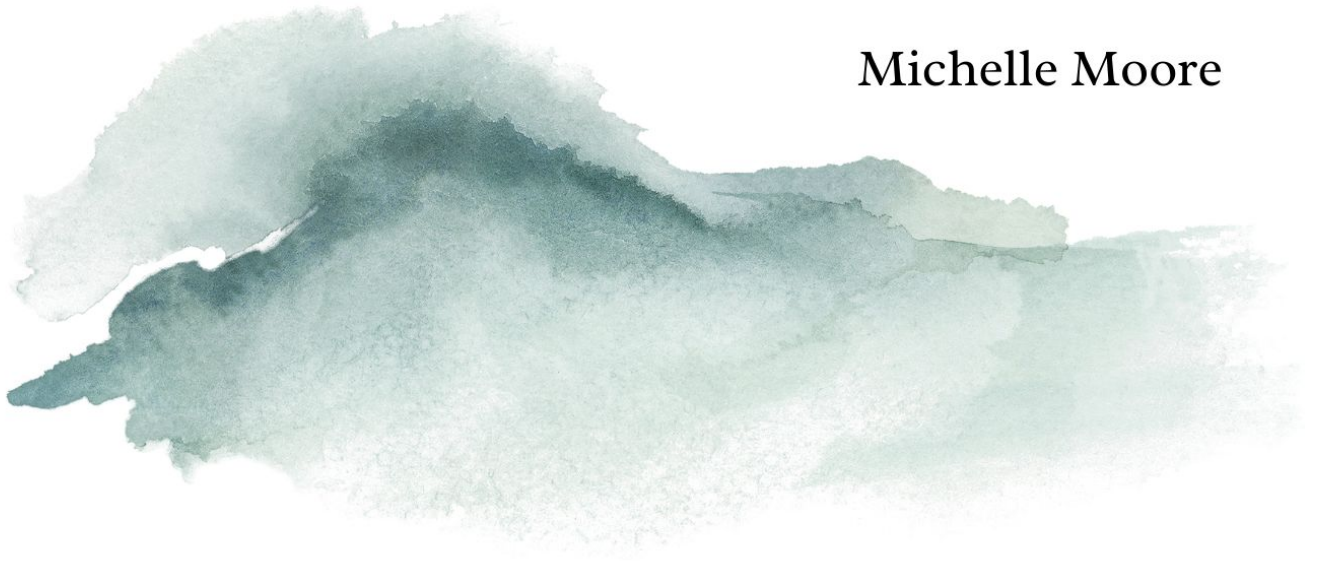

How to Get the Most out of this Scripture Writing Plan

Handwrite the daily scripture.

Use the remaining space to dive into the scripture with the following strategies:

1. **Word study:** choose a keyword. Study its definition, synonyms, antonyms, other scriptures where that word is found.
2. **Reflect:** How have you seen God fulfill this scripture in your walk with Him?
3. **Make Connections:** Look for related scriptures or people in scripture who lived out what this verse says.
4. **Draw:** Get creative. Sketch a representation of this scripture.
5. **Pray:** Write a prayer to God asking Him to help you live out each passage.
6. **Take action:** Write action steps that you can take to make a scripture part of your daily life.

This Bible Study Scripture Writing Plan is designed so that you can get what you need out of it. You choose every single day where you need to put your focus: digging deeper into meaning, in prayer, in doodling, in reflecting, in action steps. Most importantly, you are spending time allowing your heart to soak in God's word so that you have His truths tucked away for retrieval anytime you need them.

I pray these scriptures are the exact encouragement that you need to face the daily onslaught of negativity and to give you peace in a world that is filled with chaos.

What Can the *Righteous* Do?
